#### Headteacher's Introduction

Dear all,

We have been busy again this week in all areas of the curriculum with a focus on spirituality! On Monday, we went on an 'Awe and Wonder Wander' along the cycle path. We were thinking about the wonder of the natural world, what makes us say 'wow!' and 'I wonder...' questions. We had questions such as 'how do the clouds stay up in the sky?' and 'do all leaves turn through a cycle of all the autumnal colours?' In school, we reflected on how we feel about the questions we asked and what we might do differently as consequence of them.

We know spiritual development is a deeply personal journey that relates to fundamental questions about the meaning and purpose of life which affect everyone, and is not dependent on a religious affiliation.

What a joyous afternoon we had on Monday. The whole school went on an awe and wonder walk in the beautiful afternoon sunshine. Children become engrossed in looking for things they may normally miss whilst walking along. It was lovely to watch our children become mesmerised in the wonders all around them. 



